- Texas Electric Cooperative (TEC) is the state association that represents these individual
  co-ops by providing support, advocacy, and services. They were established in 1940, with
  67 distribution and 9 generation/transmission members, serving 2 million homes and
  businesses. TEC coordinates and sponsors the Government-In-Action Youth Tour in
  Texas.
- NRECA is the national service organization that represents America's electric cooperatives. It is also a cooperative. It supports more than 900 consumer-owned, not-for-profit electric cooperatives across the country, which provide power to over 42 million people in rural areas. NRECA provides advocacy, education, and training to its members to help them serve their communities, and it also has an international division that helps bring electricity to developing countries. They are responsible for the national Youth Tour.

## 2026 YOUTH TOUR INTERVIEW BCEC Information and Potential Interview Questions

- How was the Youth Tour started? President Lyndon B. Johnson, a Texas native and the 36th United States president, helped rural areas get electricity and inspired a youth leadership program sponsored by electric cooperatives. As part of their effort to improve members' lives, electric cooperatives followed Johnson's call in 1957 to send youths to Washington, D.C., to "actually see what the flag stands for and represents." Out of his remarks was born the Government-in Action Youth Tour, which is still going strong decades later, with more than 50,000 students having participated nationwide. The tour began in 1965 and has been held every year with the exception of the year COVID prevented travel.
